William Flippin, Jr., to preach on 'Day 1' Lutheran Pastor, ecumenist, and grassroots organizer The Rev. Dr. William E. Flippin, Jr., ecumenist, political activist, grassroots organizer, and pastor, is the featured preacher on July 21 on "Day 1,"

the nationally broadcast ecumenical radio program also accessible online at Day1.org and by podcast. He draws the sermon "Counterfeit Clergy" from Jeremiah 23:1-6. He says, "Jeremiah's warning to the kings of Judah should hit us present-day shepherds about six inches above the clerical collar whether we're mega-church or mini-church shepherds." Flippin is Interim pastor of St. Luke Lutheran Church in McDonough, Ga. He was pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Atlanta for six years and earlier of St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran Church in Columbus, Ga., and other churches in Atlanta and Decatur and Chicago. A graduate of Morehouse College, Flippin earned his M.Div. at the Morehouse School of Religion at the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta. He earned two Th.M. degrees, one from Candler School of Theology at Emory University and one from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago and a DMIN from Ashland Theological Seminary, Ashland, Ohio. The program includes interviews with Flippin conducted by Kime, who is also executive producer. "Day 1" has been broadcast every week for 79 years, formerly as "The Protestant Hour." Featuring outstanding preachers from the mainline denominations, "Day 1" is currently distributed to radio stations across America and overseas, and the "Day1 Weekly Program" is on all podcast apps. Upcoming Commemorations

July 3 Thomas, Apostle

Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (John 11:16), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" By tradition, he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated on December 21, Thomas's celebration is moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.

July 6 Jan Hus, martyr, died 1415

Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.

July 11Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, died around 540

Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement. Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit, and eventually gathered a community of monks around him. He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others.

July 12 Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala, died 1931

A winner of the Nobel Prize for peace for his efforts to unite peoples after the First World War, Söderblom also called attention to the revival of early church worship principles, and helped to lay the groundwork for the World Council of Churches.

July 17 Bartolomé de Las Casas, missionary to the Indies, died 1566

A native of Spain, Las Casas first came to the Western hemisphere while serving in the military. Upon arriving in the West, Las Casas was granted a large estate with Indigenous enslaved people whom he freed after he was ordained a priest. He worked in the Caribbean and Central America to improve the lives of the native peoples.

July 22 Mary Magdalene, Apostle

Sometimes called "the apostle to the apostles" because she told them of her encounter with the risen Lord, Mary was a woman of Galilee who followed Jesus throughout his ministry. She was present at Jesus' crucifixion and his burial.

July 23 Birgitta of Sweden, renewer of the church, died 1373

Birgitta married at age thirteen and had four daughters. Widowed at age thirty-eight, she gave all that she owned to the poor, and founded a community of monks and nuns led by a woman. Her work is continued to-day by the Society of St. Birgitta.

July 25 James, Apostle

James and his brother John were the sons of Zebedee, fishermen by trade before their call from Jesus. He was the first of the twelve apostles to be martyred, and his death is the only one recorded in scripture (Acts 12:1-2).

July 28 Johann Sebastian Bach, died 1750; Heinrich Schütz, died 1672; George Frederick Handel, died 1759; musicians


These three German-born musicians have done much to enrich the life of the church. Schütz was an early master who focused on settings of biblical texts. Bach wrote over 300 cantatas along with works for organ and instrumental pieces, and has been called the "fifth evangelist" for the way he proclaimed the gospel in music. Handel's great work, Messiah, is a setting of scriptural texts.

July 29 Mary, Martha, and Lazarus of Bethany

Friends of Jesus, Mary and Martha are remembered for the hospitality of their home that they offered him—Martha focused on serving their guest, and Mary on listening to him. Their brother Lazarus was raised from the dead as a sign of the greater resurrection to come.

July 29 Olaf, King of Norway, martyr, died 1030

Considered the patron saint of Norway, Olaf went from a life of piracy to becoming Christian and declaring himself king of Norway. He revised the laws and tried to administer them fairly. Driven
